

Total active membership on October 31 was 104.

Session minutes and the Church Register were reviewed by the Presbytery and approved without exceptions.

Greg Wood is now the Moderator of the Florence Emergency Cold Weather Shelter, replacing Bob DuBose. The shelter will operate this winter. The Methodist and Presbyterian churches have been given \$2000 each from shelter funds for expenses of operating the shelter.

Community dinners are continuing; 33 meals were served on November 16.

Judy Madsen was accepted as a new member; she has transferred from Calvin Presbyterian Church in Tigard, Oregon.

Exterior cameras and an intercom have been installed for increased security of staff working alone in the building.

The Finance/Admin/Personnel Committee made salary recommendations for our paid staff members.

The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 15, 2017. New elders will be elected to serve on session, and new congregational members of the Nominating Committee will be elected.
